## **Legislative Outlook**

- # Fiscal challenges, how to communicate with legislators which state program funding is most important and must not change?
- Don't waste a good crisis. How we might reengineer state service delivery to local governments (K-12 delivery, constitutional officer overlap, e.g.)



### Key Legislation Passed 2020 General Assembly

- **# Guns** − Local Control HB421
- **Affordable Housing** Another tool for incentivize AH through ADU & inclusionary zoning ordinances \$B834
- **Games of Skill** Bills to ban passed the regular session; Post-CV-19 & reconvened session now allows them until July 1, 2021, with state revenue going to CV-19 response and **local revenue** (12% of \$1200/mo/machine) with no strings. **SB971**
- **Monuments Local control HB1537**



- Crisis moments present opportunity and need, especially for the Virginia legislature
  - e.g. Legislation at reconvened session regarding public bodies and public meetings
  - Constitution of Virginia is not so easily changed,
    "Neither house shall, without the consent of the other, adjourn to another place, nor for more than three days."





Shoe Leather lobbying not an option right now. Who knows what the future will bring.



Not much, if any, face-to-face communication with legislators



State politicians, for the most part, aren't doing a lot of fundraising now

Texts, phone calls, social media & other grassroots tactics will be an even more important advocacy tool moving forward

Beware - increased prospect for communications to be taken out of context in the future --- Rule of thumb (not exactly new) .... anything you put in writing could appear on the internet or in the press

- # Feeding information to state legislators is key to helping them communicate with their constituents. We are all in the same boat
- # Providing boots on the ground in their district and access to information we have on state programs working in their districts
- \*\* Accentuating, in what will be extremely constrained budgetary years, those <u>state programs</u> and funding that have <u>the most value-added</u> and straight up impact on our members' budgets: (at-risk add-on, jail per diems, community wealth building monies, street maintenance funding).
